From the desk of the Executive Director



This communication is planned to reach you before IOI2004 and the contents will therefore be focussed on this highlight of the year.

I want to look back on the year and take stock of where we are in IOI. The year since IOI in Wisconsin has been a fascinating and exciting one and I am confident that we will see some of the energies of the last few years beginning to bear fruit this year.

On the development front, we have seen a great deal of interest in the activities of IOI. No less than twelve countries have been corresponding with us to find out how they can participate in IOI. Communication has taken place on a regular basis and it would appear that at least five of these potential participants (Bangladesh, Bolivia, Dominican Republic, Ecuador and Syria) will be attending for the first time either as observers or with a team. Another seven countries (Costa Rica, Lebanon, Lichtenstein, Panama, Phillipines, Sudan and Peru) are hard at work to participate in IOI 2005. This is a most heartening development and reflects a growing understanding and appreciation of the relevance of IOI. The other positive outcome is that in the medium to longer term, the level of competition at IOI will continue growing.

Another positive development (refer separate article) is the establishment of a small group who have volunteered to provide a translation facility of most of the documents required by members of General Assembly. At this stage translations are being made into five languages, but I am sure that will grow in future. This service will mean that it is going to be easier for some members of General Assembly, to take part in the discussions.

A negative note which also provides a challenge is the absence of contributions to this Newsletter from Individuals, Team leaders and organisers of Regional Olympiads. IOI News is yours to use and so much that is happening in various parts of the world is not being shared. So if I may make one wish for the year ahead, it is that I receive so much news that I cannot fit it all into one IOI News.

I look forward to meeting all of you in Athens. To those who cannot make it - best wishes. We will miss you.

Development of IOI

At IOI 2003, I quite spontaneously decided to be a candidate for IC membership. Thanks again to the GA for electing me. Hopefully, in the end you will find that I deserved at least a small portion of the confidence that you showed in me.

Now, being deeply involved in the operations and development of IOI, I find that there is room for improvement of many things. Following requests from several people, I suggested the need for translation of GA documents, so that GA members could have the opportunity of receiving Agendas, Minutes, Proposals etc. in their native language. Thanks to all the volunteers who agreed to serve as translators. Moreover, you will receive those documents some time before IOI, so that there is more time to prepare for GA meetings.

But this is only a first step and a quite specific issue. Arising out of the March IC meeting in Athens, and from discussions with several people, a list of tasks and projects has come up that, in my opinion, should be pursued by the IOI community. The following is a list of suggestions which was compiled from other people's and my own ideas. Some of those issues are already "in the works". I fully support all of them and hence asked the IC to put this list on the agenda of its meetings during IOI 2004. As I said, not everything on this list is new. However, the proposal is that the IOI community decide how to spend funds generated from registration fees, on the following

items, if necessary. Since this is your money, I would like you to consider these suggestions carefully and invite you to discuss them with the IC in the GA meetings of IOI 2004.

It is suggested that the IOI community should:

1. Improve and professionalize IOI operations by:
 - Implementing a system for maintenance of country contacts.
 - Implementing the official publication of IOI documents on www.ioinformatics.org.
 - Think about getting organized within some international and well-accepted organisation (e.g., IFIP).
2. Improve IOI competition by:
 - Supporting the development of one or more contest software systems into system(s) that can be provided to the IOI community and which are documented and can be easily maintained by people other than the developers.
 - Supporting the development of other software systems that are used by the community (e.g. the FreePascal compiler).
 - Supporting scientific events (workshops) that deal with informatics contests and are meant to generate and discuss new ideas concerning contest tasks and the corresponding evaluation procedures. Accept ideas from outside the community.
3. Improve the reputation of IOI by:
 - Regulating the difficulty level of IOI tasks to an appropriate level.
 - Motivating companies or non-profit institutions to sponsor prizes within IOI instead of funding their own contests.

REGISTRATION FEES

Just a reminder that a Registration fee is levied on all participating countries and is payable on or before arrival at IOI2004. The Organising Committee have made the following arrangements in this regard:

Each participating country is required to pay a Euro 250 (\$300) registration fee. These fees are due by September 11, 2004 -- the arrival day at IOI 2004. All payments must be in Euros or US dollars (cash) or Visa / Master Card.

If you want to pay ahead of time, we have arranged for payment by Bank Transfer. Be warned that the bank charges for the transfer of funds, so you will need to pay this transfer fee at your end so that it is not deducted from the registration fee. Here is what you must do.
